## *Regional Offices of Education*

Regional Superintendents are the chief administrative officers of Regional Offices of Education and the only elected education professionals in Illinois. They are the emissary between the State Board of Education and local school districts.

Regional Superintendents carry out many important duties including, but not limited to:

- Provide supervision and control over all school districts in their regions
- Act as official advisors and assistants for school administrators and teachers in their regions
- Provide positive leadership and keep educators, school districts and the public informed about education legislation, legal issues, and state programs aimed to benefit children
- Enforce state laws covering local school performance, life safety, professional licensure and curriculum
- Respond to inquiries from parents, school personnel and the public on a number of educational concerns promptly and accurately
- Issue, register and renew teaching licenses
- Administer programs for students such as G.E.D. educational programs, testing and diplomas, truancy prevention programs, and the Regional Safe Schools program
- Provide support for schools, including professional learning activities for teachers and administrators
- Conduct school compliance visits to ensure all Bureau, Henry, and Stark County schools meet state requirements
- Inspect each public school in the region annually
- Provide courses in safety for bus drivers
- Approve building and occupancy permits

In addition, the Bureau, Henry and Stark County Regional Office of Education works closely with several agencies in the tri-county region to provide students with the necessary tools for success to allow them to be successful in school and beyond.
